PINE BEACH WATER DEPARTMENT will be flushing hydrants on May 8 & 9, 9 am to 3 pm

Systems flush hydrants for several important reasons, all aimed at maintaining water quality and system integrity:

- 4. **Improving Water Quality**: Flushing hydrants can improve water quality by removing stagnant water that may have become discolored or developed an off-taste or odor due to sitting in the pipes for an extended period.
- 5. **Testing Fire Hydrants**: Flushing hydrants is also part of regular maintenance and testing of fire hydrants to ensure they are functioning properly in case of emergencies.

PINE BEACH SEWER DEPARTMENT - Wipes Are Bad News for Sewer Systems

In today's fast-paced world, convenience often comes at a cost, and one of the unsuspecting culprits wreaking havoc on our sewer systems is the humble wipe. While these handy disposable products may seem harmless, their impact on our infrastructure is anything but.

Wipes, ranging from baby wipes to makeup wipes to cleaning wipes, are designed to be durable and absorbent. However, these very qualities make them a nightmare for sewer systems. Unlike toilet paper, which disintegrates quickly upon contact with water, wipes are typically made from materials like polyester or polypropylene, which are non-biodegradable. This means that once flushed, wipes do not break down easily.

This conglomeration forms giant "fatbergs" that clog pipes and sewer lines, leading to blockages and backups. PINE BEACH FIRE COMPANY

The Pine Beach Volunteer Fire Company has been honored to provide fire protection for the residents and visitors of Pine Beach for 98 years. Since 1925, we and the men and women who served before us have worked to help make our community safe. We pride ourselves in being 100% volunteer. Last year, we responded to 183 emergency calls. Our members provided 1,042-man hours of emergency response and logged 2923 hours of individual hours of training at our fire station, with neighboring fire companies and at various



fire academies. These statistics do not reflect the additional time and man hours spent maintaining our company with work details, company business meetings, community events or our various fundraisers.

• The Pine Beach Fire Company has recently been awarded a \$55,000 American Rescue Plan Firefighter Grant through the State of New Jersey. This grant, which was applied through the Borough of Pine Beach, will help ensure our members are provided with safe, compliant PPE to wear for response to emergency calls. We thank the Mayor, Council and Borough Finance Office for their assistance in obtaining this grant.

For the LOVE of our Trees: Some Fun Facts to consider before cutting your Trees down.

Oak trees support more forms of life and more fascinating interactions than any other tree genus in North America. In most U.S. counties, oaks, cherries, willows, birches, hickories, pines, and maples are producing the vast numbers and types of insects that support animal populations.

"Oaks sustain a crucial and complex web of wildlife above ground but are just as impressive underground, producing enormous root systems that make them champions of carbon sequestration, soil stabilization, and watershed management."

"Unfortunately, the diverse web of life that is associated with oaks goes unnoticed and thus unappreciated by most homeowners and even many trained biologists. In fact, too many homeowners cut down oaks on their properties because they have grown tired of raking leaves. The cause of this indifference is lack of knowledge. How can we be interested in or understand the ecological significance of something we know nothing about"?

The removal of dead, diseased, and dying limbs are another major consideration. Making regular pruning part of your tree care plan, will help to ensure a long lifespan for your trees. When a tree has problematic branches or limbs, a tremendous amount of energy can be sent toward them to try and make repairs. This can start to affect the health of the rest of the tree. But keeping up with regular pruning can help ensure that those problematic limbs are removed and do not affect the overall health of your tree.

We understand that sometimes a tree needs to come down on someone's property. We all may find ourselves in that position at one point. Providing information will help homeowners make a more informed decision when they decide to take a native tree down.

Part of the day's activities is a parade field day and the cardboard boat races. Below is the information to get you started on the construction, we would love to see you participate!

CARDBOARD BOAT RACES RULES & INFORMATION

- 1. Waiver must be signed when registering boat.
- 2. Award will be presented to the team in the fastest boat.
- 3. Teams must consist of two people.
- 4. The boats will race 100ft and back.
- 5. All boat crew members must bring and wear their own US Coast Guard Approved personal flotation device (Life Jacket)
- 6. Boats, Boat parts, and debris MUST be disposed of by the team after the event. A dumpster will be available on site.




BOAT DESIGN AND CONSTRUCTION

- 1. Boats must be pre-built and can be "fined tuned" on site.
- 2. Boats must be made ONLY of cardboard and duct tape. NO reinforced cardboard tubes, only broken-down cardboard boxes. No industrial type of cardboard is allowed. No waxed cardboard.
- 3. Cardboard cannot be sealed with any paint or sealants. Absolutely NO use of the following items: paint, Tar-based substances, two-part varnishes, Fiberglass resin, epoxy glue, any other two-part substances or corrugated cardboard that's bonded to any material.
- 4. Duct tape may be of varying colors for creativity but must have come manufactured in said color.
- 5. Boats may be a maximum width of 5 ft (60") and a maximum length of 7 ft (84")
- 6. Boats must be propelled by use of paddle. Paddles must meet the same requirements of boats. (Cardboard and Duct Tape only) Pool noodles may also be used as oars.
- 7. The use of any prohibited boat or paddle construction items will result in disqualification.
- 8. NO surfboard style boat is allowed.
- 9. Unique boat designs and creativity is encouraged. Crew costumes are encouraged.
- 10. Your boat must be free of sharp edges, pointy objects or anything else thar could cause injuries.
- 11. Boat may be decorated with paint over the duct tape only.



Pickleball Courts at the Walling Field Complex

- Pickleball Courts are open 8:00am to dusk, weather permitting.
- The Pickleball Courts are to be used only for their intended purpose of pickleball.
- A Recreation Badge is required and can be obtained Mon – Fri at Borough Hall 9:00am-4:00pm.
- One player may not hold or occupy a court if a
 waiting line exists. During busy hours, players are
 encouraged to play doubles and a ONE-hour time
 limit exists.
- A Borough issued permit is required for Instruction, Tournaments, Clinics or Private Events. Permits require 30 days processing, available at Borough Hall.



- Proper attire is required to ensure the safety of players and the courts. NO spiked shoes.
- Children under the age of 12 years old must be accompanied by an adult.
- Pine Beach is not responsible for lost or damaged items.
- Please report any damage immediately to Borough Hall, or Police upon discovery.
- Help keep Pine Beach clean, dispose of all garbage and recyclables properly. Leave the Pickleball courts in better condition than when you arrived.
